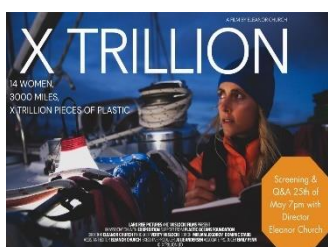
Restore Nature Now – Saturday June 22nd, 12 noon in central London

X Trillion – A Film about Plastic Pollution – Alnwick Playhouse Sat 25 May at 7.00pm

X Trillion follows the gruelling journey of eXXpedition's all-women crew led by Emily Penn as they sail 3,000 miles across the North Pacific Ocean through the densest accumulation of ocean plastic on the planet to make the unseen, seen.

The 14-strong international crew of scientists, sailors, designers, engineers, and teachers set sail on a transformative month-long voyage. 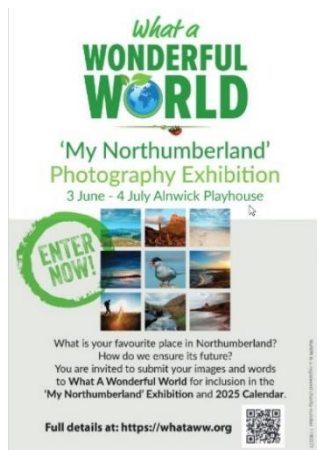

Environmental Dates for Your Diary

No Mow May – 1st May – 31st May 2024

Plant life's annual campaign, No Mow May is a simple one to take part in. Just don't cut your grass for the month of May. The aim is to provide a space for nature to do their thing. According to their website *'We've lost nearly 97% of flower rich meadows since the 1970's and with them gone are vital food needed by pollinators, like bees and butterflies'*

World Oceans Day – 8th June 2024

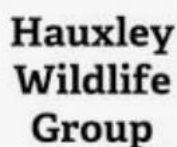

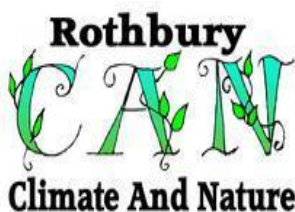
Repair Cafes

Druridge Bay Rewilding Sites on BBC One Countryfile

Northumberland Wildlife Trust is delighted that two of its Druridge Bay sites are set to feature on **BBC One's Countryfile** programme on **Sunday 19th May**.

Earlier this month, presenter Joe Crowley interviewed Lee Rankin, the Trust's West Chevington project officer at West Chevington - a former opencast mining site. During the interview, Lee talked about his work to develop the site as an area for rewilding, in partnership with local farmers and landowners.

The Druridge Bay site has the largest reedbeds in [Northumberland](#) with specialist species, such as moths, bearded tit and marsh harrier breeding there, and the return of marsh harriers to the site in 2008 after an absence as a breeding bird in Northumberland since the 1850's.

Farmers in the NE Capture Carbon Using Volcanic Fertiliser

A by-product from quarries is being given to farmers in the northeast in the hope of improving yields - at the same time as capturing carbon.

Volcanic basalt rock is being ground up and given to farmers free of charge to encourage take up of the product. Many parts of the UK are rich in volcanic rock which when in powdered form takes up carbon from the air by a process known as enhanced weathering.

While it's still operating as a trial, the company involved ([UNDO](#)) is hopeful that it can be scaled up across the UK.

Northumberland Farmer Network

Following a successful bid to the National Lottery, a [Northumberland Farmer Network](#) has been created to support Northumberland farmers and their businesses, with Helen Bullock, who has an farming background, as Northumberland Farm Network project manager.

Helen is aware of the difficulties farmers face, and she joins Northumberland Farm Co-ordinator Rachael Graham. Helen said: *"We will be seeking to emulate what has been successful in Cumbria and Yorkshire Dales but also to ensure that Northumberland Farmers specific needs are met. At this moment in time, we are asking farmers to join our contact list, so that we can keep them up to date and send our weekly Northumberland Farmers E News every Friday."*

The Network is looking for county farmers to join a Northumberland Farmer Management Council, which will be set up to ensure that network members are properly represented and will work with the team to develop a range of services and support measures prior to the official Network launch later this year.

Tiny Forests in the North East

Two "tiny forests" have been planted to provide woodland for communities and wildlife to enjoy. The forests are in Bensham and Birtley in Gateshead, Tyne and Wear, and are each about the size of a tennis court. They have been created by planting trees closely together to encourage rapid growth.

John McElroy, from Gateshead Council, said the scheme would bring "environmental and social benefits" to the communities.

The tiny forests are based on [the Miyawaki method](#), a way of planting which uses species of trees that would occur naturally in an area to create a diverse, multi-layered forest.

The scheme has been delivered by [Earthwatch Europe](#) on behalf of the [North East Community Forest](#), in partnership with Gateshead Council. It is supported by [Living Woods](#).

Gateshead Council has now partnered with the [Royal Forestry Society](#) to provide support for schools that would like to plant trees on their grounds. The council said it could support schools planting trees for shade, planting a hedge to reduce noise and air pollution, or creating their own forest area.

The Big Plastic Count – The Results Are In

Greenpeace have crunched the numbers from this year's Big Plastic Count and revealed the truly shocking results from over 220,000 supporters who took part. The Big Plastic Count shows the true scale of the plastic problem and that, despite overwhelming support for reduction, little progress has been made by supermarkets and big brands to curb production.

- The UK produces more plastic waste per person than almost any other nation – second only to the US.
- The most counted category was snack packaging (699,932 pieces), closely followed by fruit and vegetable packaging (697,085 pieces).
- Over half (58%) of the pieces are being incinerated – that's up from 46% from the count in 2022.
- Recycling will never be able to catch up with the volume of plastics being produced. Of the plastic surveyed, only 17% would get recycled domestically, 14% would be exported and 11% would end up in landfill.

It's time for governments and big brands to take action. The government must follow through with plastic reducing policies such as the Deposit Return and Extended Producer Responsibility schemes. Governments are working out a [Global Plastics Treaty](#) that could make that happen – but only if they do it right.

Little Chicks Need Your Help

Efforts are underway to support beach-nesting birds on the Northumberland coast. The [Space for Shorebirds](#) team, along with volunteers and landowners, are working to protect these birds during nesting season.

Species like ringed plovers and terns are preparing to nest on sandy beaches, with special rules in place to safeguard nesting areas. Local volunteers, including the Northumberland Coast Conservation Team, play a crucial role in monitoring and protecting nesting areas.



Gas Safety Grants

Grants of up to £500 are available for the replacement, repair, and servicing of gas appliances to provide vital gas safety interventions for vulnerable people in their homes. There can only be one intervention per household per year which may include more than one measures such as gas safety checks, gas servicing, gas boiler repairs, gas boiler replacements etc.

Applicants must live in privately owned accommodation and be one of the following:

- 60 years old or over and have low household income and/or a disability.
- Under 60 and have a low household income and/or a disability or
- Considered exceptionally vulnerable by the HIA (This is reviewed on a case-by-case basis)

Funding for home energy upgrades

Eligible residents could access a range of energy-saving improvements, including insulation for walls, lofts and floors, air source heat pumps and solar panels. You could be eligible if you live in a private home in Northumberland which is not heated by mains gas, have an income of up to £44,000 per year (depending on your circumstances), receive a means-tested benefit or you live in a specific postcode area.

Northern Powergrid Net Zero Community Energy Fund

Your group could be eligible for a grant of up to £10,000. The 2024 Northern Powergrid Net Zero Community Energy Fund has £50,000 available for new and existing community energy organisations and climate action groups in the North East, Yorkshire and Humber, and northern Lincolnshire. The fund aims to help community energy organisations start-up, build capacity, or explore

Just DO One Thing

Eat More Mussels for the Planet

Like many of us, I often wake up wondering how I could do more to combat climate change and defend the declining ecosystems. It is rarely the case that by consuming more you can help the planet – but by eating mussels you can. In addition, mussels are delicious, nutritious, quick and easy, and energy efficient to cook. Mussels are low in calories and a good source of protein, omega-3 fatty acids, vitamins and trace elements.

Farming mussels requires no fertilisers, no human-supplied feed, no pesticides and, if anything, they clean their surroundings. The mussels grow to marketable size in 1-2 years. and the farm protects the seabed it floats over, providing a form of marine reserve. The seabed beneath is safe from being ploughed up by trawlers and the ropes of mussels are home to the young of many species such as crabs, lobsters, and scallops.

Mussels incorporate carbon dioxide to make their calcium carbonate shells. Mussel shell has the potential to lock-up this carbon dioxide for millions of years. Each kilogramme of mussels you eat can sequester about 148g of carbon dioxide. If each person in the UK, on average, ate half a kilo of mussels a month (1 or 2 portions), 60,000 tonnes of carbon dioxide could be sequestered.

It has been estimated that one quarter of UK seas used as mussel farms could capture an eighth of UK carbon emissions. BUT we all would have to eat more mussels than we do now! Just as well they taste good.

RECIPE for Steamed Mussels

Mussels are usually sold live by the kilogram in net bags at £5 to £6 a kilo from a fishmonger or fish van. A kilo is sufficient for two large portions (£2.50 a portion) or four modest portions (£1.25 a portion). For a meal, I find a quarter-kilo portion is plenty with vegetables. The mussels should be kept in an open container or plastic bag in the fridge (they need to breathe) and cooked within a day or soon after. If not eaten on the day they are cooked, any remaining mussels can be put in a sealed container with their liquid and kept in a freezer.

Preparation

Check the mussels and discard any that are open unless they close when rapped on their shell. The ones that remain open are dead and should not be eaten. Pull off the beards (the threads the mussels produce to anchor themselves to rocks and ropes). Wash in fresh water, scrub shells clean if necessary.

Mussels can be simply cooked in their own juices in a heavy pan over a fire or stove and eaten when they open. (Do not eat any mussels that are not open after cooking).

Steamed Mussels

Ingredients

- 1 kg mussels (prepared as above)
- 1 sliced white onion
- 2 or more cloves garlic (crushed whole or chopped into 3 pieces)
- A little oil (olive, rapeseed, vegetable) and/or butter
- 1 carrot – thinly sliced
- Small sliced leek or alternative green vegetable
- Herbs (dry or fresh chopped parsley and/thyme) and/or a few thin parings of unwaxed lemon rind
- 50ml of water and 100 to 150 ml white wine or dry cider (vary the liquid mixture to your taste but the total liquid should be at least 150ml)
- Ground pepper to taste

Method

Use a big saucepan with lid or a pressure cooker. (The pan should be large enough to be only half full when all the ingredients are added as the mussels take up a lot of space when the shells open in cooking.) Put about a desert spoonful of the oil and/or knob of butter in the pan. Fry the sliced onion and garlic until very slightly browned (not caramelised). Add the sliced vegetables. Turn off the heat. Add some of the water to cool the pan. Add the herbs and pepper. Then add the wine or cider. Add the prepared mussels. Put the lid on the pan and heat. If using a big saucepan, simmer, lifting the lid to check every few minutes until the mussel shells have opened. If using a pressure cooker, bring to up to pressure, cook for 2 minutes, fast release the pressure and all the mussels should be cooked and open. Discard any mussels with shells that do not open after cooking.

Serve in bowls in the liquid and some good bread or rolls. Enjoy.

England's Rivers to Remain in Poor State Says Watchdog

England's rivers are likely to remain in a poor state for years to come because the government is failing to put in place EU clean water laws post-Brexit.

Under the Water Framework Directive, all rivers are supposed to attain “good” ecological status by 2027. In 2019 just 14% of rivers were in good ecological health and none met standards for good chemical health. A report by the OEP states that this aim will not be met at the current rate.

Dame Glenys Stacey, the chair of the OEP, has called the government’s failure “*deeply concerning*”, with the report finding that England is failing to put in place measures to improve the condition of rivers, lakes, and oceans. [Read the full article on The Guardian website here](#)

Britain’s Climate Action Plan Unlawful – High Court Rules

The environmental charities [Friends of the Earth](#) and [ClientEarth](#) took joint legal action with the Good Law Project against the Department for Energy Security and Net Zero (DESNZ) over its decision to approve the carbon budget delivery plan (CBDP) in March 2023.

In a ruling on Friday [3rd May], Mr Justice Sheldon upheld four of the five grounds of the groups’ legal challenge, stating that the decision by the former energy security and net zero secretary [Grant Shapps](#) was “*simply not justified by the evidence*”.

.....The judge agreed with ClientEarth and Friends of the Earth that the Secretary of State was given “*incomplete*” information about the likelihood that proposed policies would achieve their intended emissions cuts. This breached section 13 of the Climate Change Act. Sheldon also agreed with the environment groups that the central assumption that all the department’s policies would achieve 100% of their intended emissions cuts was wrong. The judge said the secretary of state had acted “*irrationally, and on the basis of an incorrect understanding of the facts.*”

Rental ‘libraries of things’ have become the new way to save money. From baby clothes to popcorn makers, borrowing items rather than buying them is a growing trend.

Washout winter’ spells price rises for UK shoppers with key crops down by a fifth

UK harvests could be down by nearly a fifth this year due to the unprecedented wet weather farmers have faced, increasing the likelihood that the prices of bread, beer and biscuits will rise and more food imported.

The warnings come as farmers have borne the brunt of the heavy rainfall and bad weather experienced over the winter, with the UK experiencing 11 named storms since September.

In England, there was [1,695mm of rainfall between October 2022 and March 2024](#), the wettest 18-month period since records began in 1836.

This has resulted in planted crops either being flooded or damaged by the wet weather, or farmers not being able to establish crops at all.
