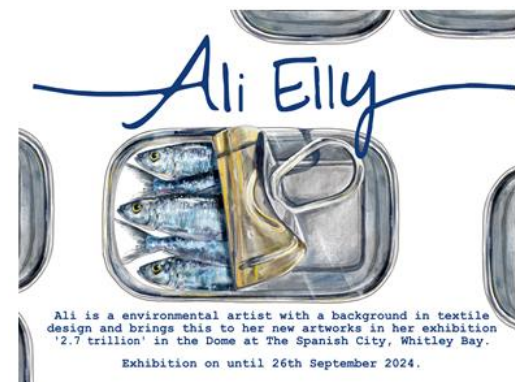


Biodiversity & Wildlife SIG

The national celebration of the diverse and delicious food that Britain produces is coming to Warkworth from September 20th – October 6th 2024.

Reasons to support British food

- **Environmental** – eating local food in season gives the lowest carbon footprint.
- **Welfare** - The UK has some of the highest welfare and food safety standards in the world.
- **Food security** – We need to support our farmers, horticulturalists and food producers to make sure they can keep feeding us.

How to Get Your News Story Published

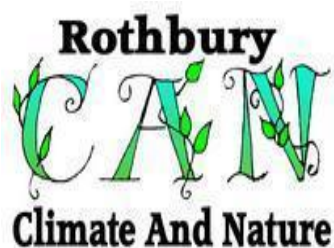

What a Wonderful World Festival Success!

Over 1,000 people took part in the What a Wonderful World Festival over a weekend in Alnwick. And many more visited the “My Northumberland” photography exhibition at the Playhouse Gallery.

The Festival of arts, science and nature explored the theme of ‘air’ through drama, music, poetry, dance and talks by leading experts on wind energy, air pollution and wildlife.

Highlights included the ‘The Air We Breathe’ performed by young people from four local schools, a sell-out concert by Northumbrian piper, Kathryn Tickell and the Northumberland Wildlife Trust’s speakers Dr Laura Keast, Professor Alasdair McDonald and the RSPB’s Bethany Chamberlain. There was also the premier of a new song by composer Janet Wheeler performed

by the Sing for the Planet Workshop choir joined by award-winning choir Voices of Hope who went on to close the festival with a delightful concert of music old and new from around the region and beyond.

Organisers, Alistair and Liz Anderson said “*we are delighted that so many people of all ages became so engaged in a wide range of artistic activity all focused on the wonders of our amazing planet, the problems of climate and biodiversity that face us and the solutions which are there to be developed if only the world could agree equitable ways forward*”.

Northumberland Farmer Launches Green Acres to Promote Environmental Awareness

A farmer from Stannington is pioneering a “local and visible” approach to help businesses and individuals become more environmentally conscious and offset their carbon footprint locally.

Farming has been a cornerstone of the Dungait family for generations, but in recent years Mike has focused on integrating environmental practices into their farming operations. His regenerative agriculture approach involves planting crops such as bumble bee bird feed mixes and grasses to rejuvenate the soil and attract predators that protect crops naturally.

Now he has developed Green Acres. Through planting trees, hedges, cultivating bee hives and maintaining grasslands, the initiative allows businesses and individuals to offset their carbon footprint directly in Northumberland.

Mike said: “*We manage people’s sustainability commitments with the knowledge that the offsetting is being done ethically and locally. We’re also giving people solid green credentials that literally don’t cost the earth.*”

The system works by people paying a monthly subscription with the basic package planting 17 trees per year, sequestering 60 tonnes of CO2 per annum.

Mike and his team are committed to involving the local community in their efforts. Green Acres offers various packages for families, individuals and businesses to join their mission and schools will soon be able to visit the site.



New ‘Wild’ Network for Northumberland

The Wilder Northumberland Network is a new network for nature recovery in Northumberland. It seeks to support nature recovery and increase connectivity, creating more space for water, trees and scrub.

Membership is open to landowners who have a minimum of 5ha designated for nature recovery or 1km of linear corridor such as hedgerows, riparian woodlands or field margins.

Membership offers a range of benefits, including peer learning, access to resources and funding opportunities and services such as access to Northumberland Wildlife Trust volunteers or grazing animals. Members are asked to sign up to a number of principles such as letting nature lead, making space for water and increasing connectivity.

Current Wilder Northumberland spaces include Benshaw Moor, College Valley Estates, Earsdon Hill Farm, Fen Letch, Hadrian's Wall Recovering Nature, Hepple Wilds, Moss Peteral, Whitelee Moor, Wild Kielder and West Chevington.

For landowners with an area less than 5ha, membership of the complementary North East Rewilding Network (NERN) is an option. NERN is coordinated by Climate Action North and supported by Rewilding Britain.

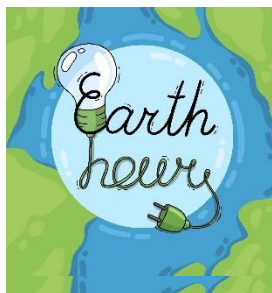


Climate Action North – Rewilding Hope, Land – Sea Online Conference

This 2 day online conference, hosted by Climate Action North, sponsored by Rewilding Britain and supported by NWT was timed to coincide with World Environment Day in June.

With a wide range of speakers including Libby Drew from Knepp Wildland, Graham Holyoak of Wilder Northumberland and Sandra King from the Beaver Trust. Climate Action North's CEO, Sharon Lashley said *"This is our most ambitious conference yet and by gathering rewilders from across the UK we hope to have ignited more passion and action for rewilding."*

EU's Nature Restoration Law Passed

At last, the new European law that's rare good news for our forests, coastlines and wildlife. After months of controversy and bitter protests that saw biodiversity become a culture war issue, the EU's nature restoration law has finally passed. On Monday June 17th, a knife-edge vote by member states gave the green light to a first-of-its-kind law to protect and revive Europe's

beleaguered forests, coastline, grasslands and wildlife.

Member states are now tasked with restoring 20% of the bloc's land and sea by the end of the decade, focusing on natural ecosystems that will store the most carbon, and halting the decline of Europe's rapidly vanishing biodiversity.

Controversial UK Offshore Petroleum Licensing Bill Dropped

Thanks to so many people raising concerns, debate on the bill had stalled.

The bill was widely condemned as a political gimmick, doing nothing for energy security while sending the wrong signal on climate across the world. With collective action, the bill met fierce opposition from members of all political parties, even leading to the [resignation of Tory MP Chris Skidmore](#).

The new proposed legislation would have required the UK to hold annual licensing rounds for new oil and gas projects. The bill also appeared to weaken already deeply insufficient climate measures by proposing new ‘tests’ for licences designed to be ‘impossible to fail’.

The Stop Rosebank action group recently delivered a petition with 108,933 signatures, to the Norwegian ambassador to the UK, calling on the Norwegian government to halt the Rosebank oil field. The Norwegian government is a majority-owner of oil giant Equinor and the action group asked it to:

- Immediately stop Equinor’s Rosebank oil field, all new fossil fuel projects and fossil fuel expansion.
- Significantly ramp up investments in renewable energy projects, while ensuring a just transition for workers.

The Ambassador promised that Stop Rosebank’s concerns would be relayed to Norway’s Foreign Minister and Trade Minister.



Restore Nature Now

Tens of thousands of people marched through London on June 22nd joining more than 350 charities, businesses and direct-action groups to demand that the government take action to protect wildlife.

Under the 2021 Environment Act, the Government made a pledge to halt the decline in biodiversity by 2030. However a report in January 2024 found the Government were on course to meet only four of the forty legally binding targets.

As a result, a coalition of 83 wildlife groups has challenged the government’s lack of progress. “We are trying to demonstrate that the British public cares about the nature and climate crisis and that they don’t think politicians are doing enough to address it” said Craig Bennett, chief executive of The Wildlife Trusts. “Whoever forms the next government....needs to understand these issues matter to the people of this country.”

Labour commitments include ‘taking action to meet our Environment Act targets’ and ‘restoring and expanding wildlife habits such as wetlands, peatbogs and woodlands’. It has promised to create nine new national river walks and three new national forests.



Additional funding for community energy projects

The new Labour government has pledged up to £400m / year in low interest loans to enable areas to develop and build community-owned energy projects. The Local Power Plan is one of three priorities for Great British Energy, a publicly owned company that will deliver investment in projects to enable the UK to be powered by 100% clean energy by 2030.

Labour has also promised to fix the delays in getting grid connections which have hampered many renewable projects and to extend shared ownership in commercial renewables projects.

The network is run by NCC and gives members an opportunity to share practice and support climate engagement. The network will meet once a quarter online, with an in-person meeting once a year.

NCC Climate Change Action Plan Published

The new NCC Climate Change Action Plan 2024 – 26 has now been published. The Plan focuses on reducing emissions from heating, energy and transport and includes emissions from methane and nitrous oxide, both of which are major contributors to the county’s greenhouse gas footprint.

The plan sits alongside the Council’s Environmental Policy Statement and explores adaptation to the effects of climate change such as flooding, coastal erosion, infectious diseases and extreme weather events.



Help to reduce agricultural emissions

Eligible residents could access a range of energy-saving improvements, including insulation for walls, lofts and floors, air source heat pumps and solar panels. You could be eligible if you live in a private home in Northumberland which is not heated by mains gas, have an income of up to £44,000 per year (depending on your circumstances), receive a means-tested benefit or you live in a specific postcode area.
