2. The Digest Interview with...



Terry Smith

Terry has lived in Northumberland for 22 years and is a member of Alnwick Area Friends of the Earth. He's been a member of NGH since it began in September 2023.

Quick-Fire Questions

Night owl or early bird?

Night owl.

Glass of wine or cup of tea?

Can't beat a good cup of tea!

Walk on the beach or art gallery?

Both are great. Walking on the beach, admiring the beauty can help appreciate art.

TV Soap or a good book?

I'm not a TV Soap person so I guess a good book is my choice.

What's your favourite place in Northumberland?

Ros Castle near Chillingham for its wonderful views including of seven castles and a real sense and evidence of Northumberland's history and with Old Bewick nearby.

What's your biggest bugbear?

Small 'c' conservatism and 'can't do' attitudes.

What's your favourite book and why?

*Oh, that is difficult. I've chosen *The Greening of America* by Charles A Reich. I read it over 50 years ago whilst I was training to be a social worker. It was an exciting period of my life when I was both idealistic and naive. I really felt at that time that the world was ready for positive change, and I was going to be part of that change! It was *The Greening of America* with some other books, together with a couple of inspirational tutors that set me on the way. I got a bit lost on the journey - but so did many others!*

What first made you interested in climate, environmental and sustainability issues?

I was brought up in beautiful Derbyshire. My parents got me interested in nature and the fight for justice for people throughout the world. Recently, I have realised that the climate and nature crisis we face is intrinsically linked to justice issues. During the middle period of my life, I was involved in campaigns which could be labelled justice issues such as the Anti-Apartheid movement. My career in social work, youth work and education reflected and informed my understanding and perspective. More recently I have seen just how much we need to do to address the climate and nature crisis, and that challenge drives me on.

Tell us about a project you've been involved in?

The children and young people project which began about three years ago. The Climate Club at the Duchess Community High School has resulted in tree planting, beach cleans, litter picks and there is now a film in progress. Links have also been forged with Ellingham CofE Primary School. The Environmental Tipping Point Challenge Game I invented reflects the global environmental and nature challenges we face, while exploring the positive actions we can all make.

Have you got a project or activity that you're looking forward to starting?

The Tipping Point Challenge Game works well with children, young people - and adults too. It stimulates lots of discussion and, hopefully, a commitment to act. I've had requests for the game packs from different groups around the UK. The next step will be to contact local primary schools to run short sessions engaging the school's older pupils in the game and discussion. As well as learning from us oldies, I have discovered that we can learn a good deal from young people. Being open to that is important and inspiring at times.

3. Active Travel



New Phase of Work to Improve Cycle Links Set to Start in Blyth

This is the latest in a network of schemes in Blyth, building on the recent improvements around Waterloo Road, which involved upgraded crossings on the A193 Renwick Road, connected by shared use footways.

The new section picks up where the previous one finished, starting at Bondicar Terrace, crossing

Marine Terrace then onto Cypress Drive. The route then follows the east side of Broadway Circle to the roundabout, onto Princess Louise Road and then onto Broadway Crescent and Kingsway.



Finally, it's on to Plessey Road and along to Wellesley Drive. The work is expected to complete around May 2025. In future there are plans to continue these improvements south to link up with the Coastal (NCN1) route in North Tyneside.

The £1.9m scheme is being funded by the Department for Transport administered via the North East Combined Authority.

Cllr Richard Wearmouth, who leads Northumberland County Council's Cycling and Walking Strategy, said: *"This is yet another step forward towards more active and sustainable transport in our county."*

It emphasises the need for co-cultivation, meaningful engagement, and representation throughout the design, construction, and operation processes to ensure accessibility, safety, and ease of navigation for all users.

4. Biodiversity & Wildlife



Five More Seabirds Go 'Red'

The Northumberland coastline is known for its colonies of seabirds, in particular at sites such as the Farne Islands and Coquet Island. But along with other locations around the UK, seabirds are in trouble. According to last years' Seabird Count, more than 60% of UK seabird species are in decline - kittiwakes and common gulls are down nearly 50% and puffin number have fallen by a quarter.

The UK's seabird colonies are globally important, but the latest research shows that 10 out of the 26 seabirds that breed on our coastlines and islands are now on the red list of birds most in need of conservation. They are in trouble because of multiple factors including climate change, unsustainable fishing practices, offshore renewable-energy development and habitat loss. There was some good news however, with two species (the shag and the black guillemot) moving off the red list.



[The England Seabird Conservation and Recovery Pathway](#) has made a list of actions to help and the banning of fishing for sand eels in the English and Scottish waters of the North Sea has been praised as a positive step. David Noble from the British Trust for Ornithology said, "*continued monitoring, by volunteers and professionals, is essential to provide timely evidence of the impact of threats and to assess the effectiveness of any conservations actions.*"



Seed Gathering Season

Although it's not quite officially autumn yet (although it feels like it!), the first signs of change are appearing. That means that [Seed Gathering Season](#) is approaching and it's a crucial time of year in the tree growing calendar.

The Tree Council are running a series of free, online talks throughout September, including a seed gathering masterclass and a talk entitled **Seeds: Time Capsules of Life**. Their website at <https://treecouncil.org.uk> also has a wealth of resources including a seed identification sheet and videos about how to grow trees from seed.



Dig Deep in Northumberland

[Dig Ventures](#) is an online Citizen Science project using a collaborative mapping platform to baseline and monitor landscape features and ecological habitats. They run several online projects giving people the opportunity to get involved in both 'in the field' and online.

A number of projects are starting in the next few months, including:

- a search for multiple habitat types along Hadrian's Wall corridor beginning in October 2024 in partnership with Northumberland Wildlife Trust, and
- another project, working with the National Trust, looking at habitat types at Wallington in November 2024, and
- an exploration of the Northumberland Coast including the Aln and Coquet estuaries, Bamburgh and Lindisfarne. This project is being run in partnership with Northumberland Coastal National Landscape.

Online training takes between 4 and 8 hours and includes two lessons plus practice exercises. It can be done at your own pace and you'll learn about different types of habitats and ecosystems, different types of observation data, how to record data and how to collaborate with fellow citizen scientists.

Incredible Edibles Network – Guerilla Gardening and Food Growing

Friday's Guardian explains how [Incredible Edible's](#) guerrilla gardening movement, started over a cuppa between two friends in 2008, encourages people to take food-growing – and more – into their own hands.

Pam Warhurst, the founder of Incredible Edible, wants the state to get out of people's way.

"The biggest obstacle is the inability of people in elected positions to cede power to the grassroots," she says.

Sixteen years ago, Warhurst left a conference addressing sustainability and climate change feeling utterly bereft at the prospect of what faced humanity. It was on the train home from that event that she made up a plan to encourage people to take charge of their own food resilience.

Since then her idea has taken root across the UK and around the world, with at least 150 Incredible Edible groups across the country, from Orkney to Cornwall, and sister movements in France, Spain, Australia, New Zealand and even Argentina.

Her message is simple. Failures of leadership around the unfolding disasters of climate breakdown, plummeting biodiversity and social disintegration have left people with only one choice: to take matters into their own hands.

“Because I am interested in systems change,” she says. “It’s the system [that is the] problem, not the people.”

6. River & Sea Water Quality



Coquet River Action Group Makes a Splash!

More than a hundred people attended the launch of the Coquet River Action Group (CRAG) in Swarland recently. The group brings together ten community groups, including parish councils, Women’s Institutes and environmental groups as well as the Northumberland Rivers Trust, to carry out citizen science water quality testing along the River Coquet from Thropton to the coast.

The large turnout reinforced what an important issue this is to many people and the wide range of interests in the river and its biodiversity.

Chair of CRAG, Jane Davis, explained that the aim is to collect scientifically relevant data that can be used to collaborate with other organisations to form a catchment community working to improve the river and its habitats.

Steve Lowe, from the [Northumberland Rivers Trust](#), told the audience that although the Coquet is a SSSI there are still many issues including invasive species, mine water legacy and farming-related run-off.

Steve then introduced speakers from several organisations which have different responsibilities for the river and its habitats. **Graham Holyoak from Northumberland Wildlife Trust** talked about plans for the Druridge Bay area, focussing on a number of key species including water voles. Steve Robson and Laura Molon from **Northumbrian Water** provided an overview of the multi-million-pound investment plans to reduce sewage overflows and improve sewage treatment works. Lastly, **Mark Middleton from National Landscapes** talked about a variety of projects taking place around the Amble and Warkworth.

An enthusiastic question and answer session included discussion about extending the project into the upper Coquet, how to obtain [Designated Bathing Water](#) status, issues related to mine water pollution and ‘forever chemicals’, the types of monitoring carried out by Northumbrian Water and how to get young people involved in the project.

Saving the Seas One Dive at a Time in Northumberland

Phoebe Smith writes about a fantastic new eco initiative in the diving community. With 70% of all marine debris sinking to the bottom of the ocean, some dive shops are now teaching divers how to safely pick litter from the sea floor with **'Dives Against Debris'**.

Other green diving skills are being taught alongside the litter picking to help protect and minimise impacts to marine life and habitat on dives. By teaching these skills, the dive centres can be classed as eco centres by the Professional Association of Diving Instructors (PADI).

One of the dive companies, in South Shields, offers a seal awareness course. Run by marine biologists, the course covers the ecological importance of seals, encouraging responsible interaction with the seals, and reducing the impact of dives on the seals' habitats.

Is it a Bird? No, It's a Drone!

Northumbrian Water are piloting the use of a drone to accelerate water quality monitoring.

They will be carrying out flights in the Coquet estuary during September and October and will measure various water quality parameters in hard-to-reach areas, with minimal disturbance to the natural environment.

The drone has a wingspan of 2m and can fly up to 45 km/hr and it's hoped the project will demonstrate how this technology could monitor water quality in real time.

Stronger Shores

The [Stronger Shores project](#) is working to make British coastlines and communities stronger in the face of flooding, coastal erosion and climate change. It's being carried out in conjunction with the Environment Agency, Newcastle University, Plymouth University, North

Sea Wildlife Trusts and Tees Rivers Trust.

Part of the project will involve rebuilding sea grass meadows, kelp forests and oyster reefs. They are looking at sites around Alnmouth and Amble and will shortly be looking for volunteers.

A one-day event to learn about creating woodland organised by [Living Woods CIC](#), a Hexham-based organisation devoted to the creation and sustainable maintenance of woodland, will be taking place in the Tyne Valley.

The WoodNet event will include visits to two newly created woodlands, both established by residents. One is a former GP and the other a former forester, who are keen to see more woodland created in the area. They will share their experiences, lessons, and challenges faced in their journeys. Attendees will get the chance to explore each site and discuss various topics such as funding, challenges such as deer, woodland design, and species selection. There will also be an opportunity to network with other participants.

Living Woods CIC works with land managers and communities to help them put "the right tree, in the right place, for the right reason" and create diverse and productive habitats for people and wildlife. They also manage existing woodland sustainably and operate a project called Rekindle, which produces sustainable local firewood, charcoal and coppice products. The Coquet Shorebase Trust are generously giving us use of a room free. There will be refreshments. Parking is on The Braid car park.

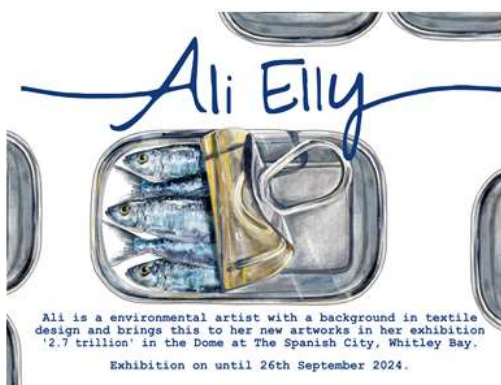

He will be coming to tell us about this and other local art projects linking with environment.

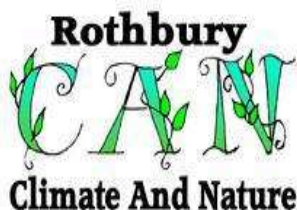
The [March for Clean Water](https://marchforcleanwater.org) is intended as a national gathering of all those concerned and outraged about the state of our waterways.

Introducing – Climate Action Network Northumberland (CANN)

Climate Action Networks were founded by the United Nations in 2014 as a loose network of independent community-based activity groups in all countries of the world to share knowledge and experience of tackling climate crisis.

CANN was formed in 2019 with the sole aim to petition Northumberland County Council to declare a climate emergency and create a climate action plan, which the Council did very promptly. We thought our work was done but CANN was then invited to nominate a representative to join the Council's Climate Action Steering Group (along with representatives from a few other groups in the community) to develop and deliver that plan. CANN has subsequently sought to represent the views of active climate groups in the area to the Council, and conversely to spread the message of what the Council is attempting to do through the Climate Action Plan.

[CANN has a Facebook page](#) (currently with 947 followers) which acts as a hub for environmental groups to share ideas and actions within or relevant to Northumberland. It also uses email messages to share issues and consult with 82 'active supporters' on specific matters concerning the Action Plan.

9. Environmental Awareness Dates



Second Hand September – 1st Sept to 30th Sept 2024

This campaign is a month-long annual celebration by Oxfam to promote buying second hand and reduce waste. By buying second hand, we can reduce our carbon footprint.

Organic September – 1st September 2024 to 30th Sept 2024

This annual campaign is led by the [Soil Association](#) who work tirelessly to raise awareness of the benefits organic farming. This isn't just important for our health, but the planet too. This environmental day is one for the diary. Artificial fertilisers are depleting the nutrients we need in our soils to grow food.

International Day for the Preservation of the Ozone Layer – 16th Sept 2024

This is a key [environmental day](#) in history when, in 1987, the Montreal Protocol on Substances that Deplete the Ozone Layer was adopted. As the treaty turns thirty five on Ozone Day, we will remember how the Montreal Protocol ended one of the biggest threats ever to face humanity as a whole: the depletion of the ozone layer. When the world found out that ozone-depleting gases used in aerosols and cooling were creating a hole in the sky, they came together. They showed that multilateralism and effective global cooperation worked, and they phased out these gases. Now the ozone layer is healing, allowing it once again to shield humanity from the sun's ultraviolet radiation.

World Car Free Day – 22nd Sept 2024

13. News from Around the Region



New Offshore Wind Farm Projects Given Go Ahead

Nine offshore wind farm contracts have been awarded by the government, boosting the UK's renewable energy sector. The Labour government is aiming to produce 60GW of energy through offshore wind farms by 2030 - the latest projects will provide capacity of 4.9GW.

Greenpeace spokesperson, Ami McCarthy said "5GW of offshore wind is of course welcome, but it is only about half of what is required each year to meet the government's 2030 target."

The auction also awarded contracts to about 90 new solar farms with a total capacity of 3.3GW and 22 new onshore windfarms with a total capacity of 1GW. The world's largest planned floating offshore windfarm was also awarded a contract. For the full Guardian article click [here](#)

The RSPB recently funded a study, published in Science Direct, which showed that sufficient onshore wind and solar can be deployed within the UK to support a net-zero energy sector - without significantly impacting how much food we produce, the extent of available habitat for breeding birds or the ability to reduce greenhouse gas emissions in the agricultural and forestry sectors.

"The challenge here is not the amount of land we have available, but how local, devolved and national government manages our use of it. A strategic approach to choosing which sites renewables are built on is necessary, and nature must be embedded as a top priority in the site selection process. There are obvious ways in which to do this – through giving the new body GB Energy a nature recovery remit for instance."

We've love to reach as many communities as possible, so if you have an idea for a project, or are up and running but would like some support, please ask!

Tash and Raven are the Nextdoor Nature project team and can support you in all sorts of ways. We have access to small pots of funding to help get the ball rolling, we can link you to advice e.g. on how to become a constituted group, how to set up insurance for your group etc., We can support community events to promote your project and more! We will be running training events within communities, so if there's a green skill that you'd like to have and know a few others that might be interested, let us know. We can bring in external specialist trainers to share their knowledge. So far, GIS mapping training has been requested, potentially to be run in Alnwick, as multiple NGH members suggested they'd be interested in this. We are also exploring scythe and meadow management training in Amble to complement our work with the Women's Workshop.

If you have any ideas for training where you live, or if you are/know of local trainers offering green skills, please get in touch. We'd love to use the funding to support local businesses.

Milestones hit as Northumberland Line nears completion

Key milestones have been achieved on the Northumberland Line project, including the opening of the Newsham Roadbridge and the Palmersville underpass, and the installation of a cycle bridge in Blyth. Passenger trains are set to begin test runs for the first time in 60 years, with a full service expected by December 2024.

Gas Safety Grants

Grants of up to £500 are available for the replacement, repair, and servicing of gas appliances to provide vital gas safety interventions for vulnerable people in their homes. There can only be one intervention per household per year which may include more than one measures such as gas safety checks, gas servicing, gas boiler repairs, gas boiler replacements etc. Applicants must live in privately owned accommodation and be one of the following:

- 60 years old or over and have low household income and/or a disability.
- Under 60 and have a low household income and/or a disability or
- Considered exceptionally vulnerable by the HIA (This is reviewed on a case-by-case basis)

Funding for home energy upgrades

Eligible residents could access a range of energy-saving improvements, including insulation for walls, lofts and floors, air source heat pumps and solar panels. You could be eligible if you live in a private home in Northumberland which is not heated by mains gas, have an income of up to £44,000 per year (depending on your circumstances), receive a means-tested benefit or you live in a specific postcode area.
