Lynne Russell

Quick-Fire Questions

Night owl or early bird?

Glass of wine or cup of tea?

TV soap or a good book?

A good book.

What was your first job?

Audit assistant at Alnwick District Council in 1989. I didn't stay long before going off to study law at university, but I am still friends with many of the old ADC staff.

What's your favourite book and why?

I have 100's of favourite books. I read my first William Boyd book recently, 'The Romantic', and fell in love with it. It follows the life of one man across continents in the 19th century, with a love affair in the background. I could pick up the book and switch off from modern life for a while.

What's your favourite place in Northumberland?

Another difficult one! Either a walk up to Blawearie, with the views of the Cheviots, or the walk from Ford to Routlin Lynn waterfall. I love waterfalls.

What do you do to relax? Gardening. Whether growing veg, weeding or just sitting out in it, I love the insects, animals, frogs and birds.

What first made you interested in climate, environmental and sustainability issues?

I have always been a very keen nature lover, partly due to John Almond, a nature-writer in Northumberland who sadly passed away in 2016. John was my science teacher at school, and I was part of his Bird Club. He instilled a real passion for wildlife in children. Seeing Blue Planet II at the end of 2017 woke something in me. I had been living in ignorance of the extent of the plastic crisis, and I had to take action. Seeing dead birds and whales with stomachs filled with plastic horrifies me still.

Tell us about a project you've been involved with

I was a Keep Britain Tidy litter hero for several years, winning a national award in 2020, just before we went into lockdown. I attended conferences on rubbish and sat with other like-minded people to help shape policy and campaigns. I started a local litter picking group in 2018 which really took off. The Northumberland Gazette gave me a column and I took 100's of people out litter picking and beach cleaning. This included schools, cub scouts and corporate groups. We even had the BBC turn up to one beach clean.

3. Active Travel



SIG Update

The Transport and Active Travel SIG has been sharing developments in sustainable travel. Cargo bikes, electric car-sharing schemes, and the ongoing challenge of reducing car use for festivals and events have been at the forefront of discussions this month. In one particularly interesting development, the [Derwent Valley Car Club](#) has obtained funding, which will enable it to support other communities in setting up similar initiatives.

Ownership and E-Bike Use in the Lake District National Park

A report linked to the Journal of Transport Geography and published early this year on E-bike use and ownership in the Lake District National Park showed that

- E-bikes are being used to reduce car travel in a touristic, rural wet and hilly area and have decarbonisation potential.
- There is support for car restraint in a UK National Park and a need for secure e-bike storage.
- E-bikes are being used for errands as well as commuting in a rural National Park.
- Relatively high levels of use and support for e-bikes continue after easing of Covid restrictions in 2021.

Apparently, well over 600 people attended the afternoon event. The event made it onto the front page of the Hexham Courant.

4. Biodiversity & Wildlife



SIG Update

This month, the Biodiversity SIG has been sharing valuable information on a variety of nature-related topics. Discussions have ranged from rewilding projects and bird flu updates to practical advice on bulb planting. The group has also recommended inspiring podcasts and highlighted the charity *Common Ground*, which focuses on reconnecting people with nature and encouraging communities to take responsibility for their local environment.

Bird Flu Returns to Northumberland Beaches

HPAI (bird flu) strain H5N5 has been confirmed from 5 fulmars collected at Druridge Bay on 25 Sept and from a further 3 collected at Seaton Sluice on 28 Sept. A sad picture is emerging. This is the likely cause for the whole incident with so many fulmars affected.



Butterfly Numbers Fall Dramatically

Butterfly Conservation slammed 'an obsession with tidiness' in British gardens and green spaces that is 'just really bad for nature', after the public counted recorded the lowest ever butterfly numbers this summer.

The Big Butterfly Count, organised over three weeks in the summer, [asked members of the public to spend 15 minutes recording the butterflies](#) they saw in a nearby green space. The charity found this year's results to be the worst in the 14-year history of the citizen science project.

The charity said butterflies were hit by a wet spring and cool summer - but warned that seasonal variations come on top of serious long-term declines. The insects are under pressure from loss of habitat, pesticides, and extreme weather driven by climate change.

Water Quality SIG Update

Water quality has been a hot topic in the news lately, and this month was no different. The Water Quality group has been focusing on both local and national issues, with highlights including the possibility of achieving Bathing Water status for Little Shore in Amble and positive news about an increase in fish numbers recorded in the River Coquet. The group has also shared near real-time data on sewage spills following recent heavy rainfall, shedding light on the ongoing challenges of protecting our waterways.



Surfers Against Sewage Launches FREE Ocean School Resource

The Surfers Against Sewage Digital Ocean School is a platform that provides resources for learning about the ocean and taking action to protect it. The school's activities are designed to help young people feel connected to the ocean, understand marine issues, and learn how to make a difference.

The Digital Ocean School includes:

Water Quality scene

A 360° virtual river location where users can learn about water quality, test their knowledge, and explore facts and videos.

Ocean School Activities

Fun ways for students to learn about the ocean and take action to protect it.

Resources for Teachers

Everything needed to run an Ocean School class, whether it's with students, family, or friends.

Ocean School doesn't just educate young people about critical marine issues. It gives them fun ways to see, hear and collect the evidence for themselves - showing how even the smallest activist can make a huge difference, no matter where they live.

Surfers Against Sewage is a UK charity that campaigns to protect the ocean from plastic pollution, sewage, industrial exploitation, and climate change. The charity was founded in 1990 by a group of surfers from Cornwall.

70 Endangered Crayfish Found Dead in River Wansbeck

The Environment Agency (EA) is carrying out investigations around the River Wansbeck in Northumberland, where the native white clawed crayfish died. Tests have already ruled out pollution and white spot syndrome virus, as well as crayfish plague. People are urged to help prevent the spread of any potential

infection by thoroughly cleaning boots and equipment that has been in the river.

Sarah Jennings, the EA's area environment manager urged anyone who spotted any crayfish, dead or alive, to call the **Environment Agency Incident Hotline Telephone: 0800 80 70 60**.


Hundreds of water pollution incidents not visited immediately in Northumberland

A freedom of information request by RADAR shows the [Environment Agency](#) is attending fewer incidents across [England](#) than before the pandemic. The figures show there were 578 water pollution incidents in [Northumberland](#) between 2018 and 2023, just 138 of which were visited immediately by Environment Agency staff. This means they were attended within two hours of a report coming in, or within four hours outside of the normal working day – a definition set by the organisation.

It is unclear whether these incidents were checked at a later date or not at all.

Storm Overflows Map following Heavy Rain



Persistent heavy rain on October 8th and 9th, led to localised flooding and discharges of raw sewage into the River Coquet at Rothbury and into many other waterways across the county. Pollution alerts were posted for beaches at Warkworth, Amble and Druridge Bay. In February 2025, [Nature North](#) will launch a plan for Nature recovery for people and places across the north of England. Nature North is a cross-sector

collaboration for large-scale nature recovery in the North of England, involving more than 35 organisations from across the North including Government Agencies, Protected Landscapes, conservation NGOs, funders, business, farming organisations, health and civil society. With its rich natural assets, strong identity and devolved leadership there is an opportunity for nature recovery to play a key role in a thriving North, and our region will be leading the way in setting out a pan-regional approach to nature recovery which will drive investment.

More information about the sessions: Please only book on one session. Each session will be 2 hours, online on Teams, with multiple dates available. There will be a comfort break planned.




International Walk to School Month


Connecting with Newbiggin Environmental Group

Warkworth Green Matters and WARivers Group

WGM has started planting the 200 plus perennial wildflower plug plants, plus hundreds of daffodils and fritillary donated by the Rotary, in verges and special areas around the village. In addition, Warkworth Parish Council have supported us with funding for biodiversity, water testing and helping sustainability. Our native daffodils have been planted around the cherry trees on Morwick Road. Bluebells are next and a sustainable water feature using water harvested from the roof is being devised for early next year. WGM members also have been scything! Lessons ongoing!

It's great to see people getting involved whatever the weather and that's certainly true for our gallant band of River Testers as well as the planters. Since April, trained volunteers go out each Monday to sample and test on 7 different sites in Amble and Warkworth as part of the [CRAG Citizen Science project](#). WARivers also have regular meetings with speakers and have recently been on a field trip to Warkworth Waterworks
