3. Climate Crisis Response

Tipping Point Game Takes Off!



NGH member Terry Smith has worked in partnership with Alnwick Area FoE and the Duchess's Community High School to develop The Tipping Point Challenge. This is a cooperative game reflecting the global environmental and nature challenges we face and explores the positive actions we can make.

Buy the Game

The game has now been used by schools, community groups and families from the very far north of Scotland down to the south coast of England. The game is available to purchase for £20 – this is just £1 more than the cost to have them

made and all the money from sales goes to making more games and ensuring the powerful messages of the game go far and wide. No money from it goes to any individual.

The game consists of two sets of 48 wooden bricks, Challenge and Change, Dilemma and Threat cards. It's fun to play but the main benefit is that it encourages discussion about these very important issues. 4. Active Travel

New Advisory Panel for Bus Travel

Two years ago, Swarland & Newton Action on Climate (SNAC) led a project which culminated in the commissioning of a one day/week bus service for the area – enabling users to travel to Alnwick and Morpeth, leaving their car at home, reducing their carbon footprint – and reducing social isolation. The group is now trying to expand the service and is meeting with officers and councillors at NCC later this month.

One aspect of the project has involved understanding developments in public transport within the wider North East Combined Authority and the following summarises the latest position.

A new Bus Network Forum/Bus Advisory Panel has recently been set up. This is an apolitical body which will engage with relevant organisations (private, public and third sector) and try to ensure that delivery of the Bus Service Improvement Plan (BSIP) is centred on the needs of the people of the North East. It will feed into an 'Enhanced Partnership Board', which will work with transport operators in the region while the region moves towards public control and franchising of public transport – likely to take at least two years.



The North East mayor and cabinet will take charge directly of big regional projects (such as the extension of the Metro), but there will also be local boards that can take decisions about individual routes/timetables etc. BSIP funding will continue for the next two years, with further funding coming from central government to the mayoral authority.

An initial Network / Panel meeting took place in June and was devoted to discussing what topics should be covered, what organisations should be represented, whether bus operators should be a part of it and what would be criteria for being a panel member. There will be a further meeting in September.

5. Biodiversity & Wildlife

Sharp Decline in Arctic Tern Numbers

A vital seabird breeding site in Northumberland has seen a worrying drop in Arctic tern numbers this summer. According to the National Trust, which manages the Long Nanny site near Beadnell, the number of nesting Arctic terns has fallen by nearly a third compared to last year. Just 724 nests were recorded this year, down from 1,037 in 2024.

This decline follows a series of challenges for these rare birds. In June, a high spring tide washed away many occupied Arctic and little tern nests, despite efforts by National Trust rangers to protect

them. The news also comes just 10 months after Arctic terns were added to the UK's Birds of Conservation Concern Red List due to steep population declines.

James Porteus, lead ranger at Long Nanny, said: *"After years of storms and bird flu impacting numbers, we're saddened by this year's further decline. The exact cause is unclear, but climate change, reduced food availability, and disease are likely factors."*

Arctic and little terns, which breed on the fragile dunes and beaches at Long Nanny, are increasingly threatened by rising sea levels, stronger storms, and other environmental pressures. The drop in nesting pairs is a stark reminder of the urgent need to protect our coastal wildlife in the face of a rapidly changing climate.

6. Rivers, Sea & Coast

Bathers Counted at Little Shore

Coquet River Action Group's (CRAG) Little Shore Bathing Water Status Application (BWSA) is gathering strength with a range of community groups raising awareness and expressing support in a variety of creative ways.

Community Involvement

Dovecot Arts held their monthly 'Crit on the Beach' and Julia Chambers from CRAG Little Shore was on hand to explain that BWS would lead to regular testing of Little Shore, public information on water quality and a plan in place to improve maintain water quality in the future.



Dry Water Arts, an Amble based Art and wellbeing Centre, know Little Shore as an exceptional space for meditation, reflection, exercise and fun. They got people painting, story-telling writing and using poetry to show how much the area means to them. They also hosted a Learn to Read the Water – Keep safe event with two amazing long distance swimmers - Frances Anderson and Jane Hardy, together with Tim Stuart of the Shore base Trust, to raise awareness of the bid.

Community consultation is a key part of the application, and at all the events people have been encouraged to complete a questionnaire. The first two Bathing Surveys have also taken place and despite the windy and overcast weather there were over a hundred people in the water each day – just what was needed for the application. Counting will take place again in August on either the 9th or 10th.

Estuary Pollution Monitoring

In April of this year members of the Greener Berwick Estuary Pollution Action Group started training with the Environment Agency on a project they are running at Fenham Burn. The objective is to monitor phosphorus and nitrogen levels in relation to the tidal changes in the salinity of the water.

The Coquet River Action Group (CRAG) are also involved and have been assisting with training for this citizen science initiative. Monitoring is monthly over the summer period and every two months over the winter. Results are forwarded to the Environment Agency and Northumbria Water.

The Greener Berwick group monitoring Tweed Estuary Pollution has also submitted evidence to the People's Commission on the Water Sector and supports the [Report's recommendations](#). The People's Commission has a wider remit than the governments' own commission on the water sector, called the Cunliffe commission, which is running simultaneously.

7. Warmer Homes

Community Energy Advice Available

Northern Powergrid's Community Energy Team is keen to offer comprehensive, practical support to community groups wishing to help people increase the energy efficiency of their houses or develop plans for renewable energy.

NCC Wins Energy Efficiency Awards

Northumberland County Council has won two awards for its work to improve the energy efficiency of homes across the county. The council won the Regional Council / Local Authority of the Year and the Regional Vulnerable Customer Support Organisation of the Year categories. They were also commended in the Regional Large Scale Project of the Year in the North East Energy Efficiency Awards.

The awards recognise the progress the council has made in delivering energy efficiency improvements to 329 homes and 40 schools and community buildings. They have also provided energy vouchers to nearly 1,400 households and given energy advice to around 900 homes.

Women's Workshop Gets Environmental Award



Congratulations to the **Amble Women's Workshop** who have achieved the **Investors in the Environment (IiE) Silver Accreditation**.

They have shown that they have put policies and procedures in place and completed relevant actions, which have enabled them to succeed in reducing their carbon footprint by at least 2% per year for the last 3 years.

CAW Gets People Talking

Climate Action Wansbeck spent Big Green Week out and about, running four listening stalls, talking to more than 150 people during the event and carrying out an online survey.

Overall, the level of concern about the climate and biodiversity was high, and people were mostly supportive of more action by individuals, local and national governments and big business.

The group's next Climate Reading Group will be discussing Kaliane Bradley's novel *The Ministry of Time*.
