#### Welcome to New Members

#### NGH Community Event – The Future of Food

Attendees at September's event were treated to a lively talk by Sarah Bredin-Kemp from the Full Circle Food Project in Ashington. The project provides food education giving people the skills they need to grow their own produce, as well as running cooking classes and workshops. There was also a short video highlighting a range of issues from land

use to the impact of different farming practices and the impact of big business. Sue Brown provided an overview of both the National and Northumberland Food Strategies and during the break participants contributed to the creation of a resource identifying a wide range of food initiatives, community orchards and farmers markets in Northumberland. Finally, members discussed a range of topics from Northumberland's Food Story to Influencing Strategy Makers.

#### NGH Holds First AGM

We held our first Annual General Meeting at the beginning of the morning. This included an Annual Report about the how the network has grown and developed over the last 12 months.

After thanking Colin Elliot for his work on the Steering Group since NGH was formed in September 2023, current members Julia Chambers, Mike Powell and Liz Clark were re-elected and were joined by Lesley Long.

Whilst NGH has continued to develop and grow, Liz highlighted an over reliance on a small number of individuals on the Steering Group, which may impact on the network's capacity in the future. The Steering Group would love to be able to move towards a more sustainable model in which there is greater

## 2. Podcast Project

### Project Update



NGH has submitted a funding application to the Community Foundation for the sum of £5,000 to launch a pilot, collaborative, community podcast called '*In Tune with Nature- Conversations for a Greener Future*'. The aim is to train and mobilise members of the NGH network and other local environmental groups in north and southeast Northumberland to record and publish their stories and inspire others to get involved.

The intention is that the podcast will reach a wider audience, including those who might not otherwise engage with environmental and sustainability topics. It will focus on environmental issues and successes that are specific and relevant to our community. The conversational format of a podcast will allow for in-depth exploration of issues such as the impact of pollution on local health, or rewilding a neglected space in a former mining area. Using storytelling, the podcast will make these topics engaging and relatable.

We know that NGH network members, and other grassroots community groups in our area, possess invaluable local knowledge and expertise about their environment. The podcast will provide a platform to share their experiences. We hope this will enable listening communities to develop solutions which are more relevant and appropriate for them.



## 4. Biodiversity & Wildlife

### Clean up at bird sanctuary

Green algae have recently been removed from Budle Bay near Bamburgh in an attempt to protect local wildlife. The algal bloom can kill valuable seagrass and damage delicate habitats.

Researchers from Newcastle University have been trying to find out why the blooms have grown at the bay and are pioneering new ways to safely remove it.

Budle Bay is part of the Lindisfarne National Nature Reserve and is home each winter to thousands of wildfowl and wading birds. It's thought that the algae blooms are linked to an increase in nutrients flowing into the bay and scientists have been working to find the source.

The work is part of the Life Wader project being carried out by Natural England, Newcastle University, the Environment Agency and Tweed Forum. The team are even exploring whether the algae can be repurposed into fertiliser or to create paints and dyes.

### New Science Hub on Lindisfarne

September 19<sup>th</sup> 2025

A new volunteer-led science hub has opened on Lindisfarne and will support studies on climate adaptation, marine ecology and species protection across the north east.

Research will focus on the nature reserve's unique landscape which supports large bird colonies as well as nationally important seagrass beds. Scientists from across Northumberland, Natural England and regional universities are involved. A variety of health and wellbeing programmes will also be available, looking at the role of nature in improving mental health.

## 5. Rivers, Sea & Coast

### Little Shore Update

After all the planning, organising and counting over the summer, the Amble Little Shore Bathing Water Status application has been sent to DEFRA! Now the wait.....

The application will be sent out for consultation to more than a dozen different bodies and the outcome is expected in 3 – 6 months.



### CRAG Annual Meeting

The Coquet River Action Group has had a great year with chemical and bacterial testing, invasive weed removal and river fly testing increasing all along the river. New activities involving schools, electronic sondes (a device to measure water quality in inaccessible locations) and collaboration with the Environment Agency are also being planned.

The group's Annual Meeting is being held on October 23<sup>rd</sup> at 7pm for a 7.30pm start. The meeting is open to all and this time the focus is on 'Current Affairs – the Coquet River Story'. It promises to be a wide ranging and interesting evening, beginning with a roundup of CRAG's activities during the last year followed by 3 speakers led by Steve Lowe (formerly of The Rivers Trust). Subjects will include river ecology, catchment sensitive farming and flooding.

## 6. Updates from Groups



### Climate Action Wansbeck


Late September brought the culmination of a year working with a range of groups, charity funding, and the hard work of allotment members to finish our new orchard.

The orchard is a celebration of 100 years of the establishment of Wansbeck Road, Ashington Allotment Association and to commemorate the men of Ashington returning from WW1. The orchard, being the first and only one in Ashington, will leave a legacy for the Allotment Association as we share the beautiful space and produce with the wider community.

Despite the torrential rain, we went ahead with an opening event on Saturday 20th September and a good number of people involved with the project came along together with their friends and families. The event was officially opened by Pauline Thompson, the Civic Head of Ashington Town Council.

After a three month break, CAW had its AGM meeting on 23rd September at the White Swan in Morpeth. After the chair, secretary and treasurer's reports, we discussed future projects. It was decided to focus on the river Wansbeck in the hope of bringing together CAW members and to connect with other environmental groups involved with Wansbeck protection. We agreed to name the project 'Is the Wansbeck Alive?' as a nod to Robert MacFarlane's book 'Is the River Alive'?

### Alnwick Area Friends of the Earth

On October 7th Alnwick Area Friends of the Earth (AAFoE) held a free film night at Alnwick

Playhouse. This began with two films, one showing school pupils engaging with nature and talking about how they felt about the climate crisis, followed the film 'Leaving it Better' about a project that brought together environmental campaigners and Pennine farmers to discuss environmental issues and find common ground. The evening concluded with a very interesting discussion.

Terry Smith has recently demonstrated the Tipping Point game at Rothbury Climate and Nature's 'Great Big Green Event' and at Northumberland Wildlife Trust's 'Nature for Health & Wellbeing Fair'. He will also be taking the game to Greener Amble's Fair on Saturday October 18<sup>th</sup>.

AAFoE also joined FoE's 'Big Climate Plan' campaign by contacting the local MP and NE mayor, urging them to back a national climate plan that fully meets the UK's climate targets and empowers local leaders to take action. Members have also participated in the 'Stop Rosebank' Day of Action, engaged with the consultation on the expansion of Newcastle airport, and arranged the annual 'Apple Pressing Day' at Bullfield Community Orchard.

### The Green Table NORTHUMBERLAND

The first meeting of The Green Table, organised by Northumberland CAN, was hosted by Leanne Shipley, Climate Action Officer and Christine Nichols, Community Development Officer. Around 30 people from organisations across north and southeast Northumberland attended the event in Rothbury.

The Green Table plans to deliver two more events to unite organisations and community groups keen to tackle climate change and promote local sustainability. These events are on 27<sup>th</sup> January 2026 in Humshaugh, and Berwick on 14<sup>th</sup> May 2026.

The speaker for the event was Paul Barrett, Community Development Officer with Northumberland Wildlife Trust, who gave an update on his work with communities in the area as part of the acquisition strategy for the [Rothbury Estate](#).

There was a significant presence from CAN, representing the [CAIRN](#) project, Off Grid Energy Advice, projects along the River Wansbeck and the [Rural Employment Hubs](#) project amongst others. CAN has a range of resources available for voluntary, community and social enterprises to borrow for free including infrared cameras and other items aimed at enhancing household energy efficiency and safety.

Representatives from the [National Innovation Centre for Rural Enterprise \(NICRE\)](#) spoke about the various projects they are engaged with, including lower carbon food business logistics, innovation in agriculture, net zero transitions in community spaces and the redevelopment of rural buildings and community-led housing.

Finally, there were representatives from several parish and town councils including Bowden, Rothbury, Bedlington all eager embrace their role in tackling climate change resilience and energy efficiency solutions.
