Following the September event which focused on food, a small group of NGH members have expressed an interest in taking these issues forward jointly with others. Some are interested in forming a group to take action, others to be part of a WhatsApp group sharing action ideas.

The most popular topics are reducing food waste, minimising packaging and the availability of local seasonal food. There is also interest in engaging with the Northumberland food strategy and in a practical food related project.

One practical outcome of the September meeting was the creation of an interactive food map of Northumberland. People have been submitting additional food projects, farm shops, etc. so we are developing a useful and practical guide to buying local and supporting access to healthy food.

Support for Rothbury Estate

Sir David Attenborough has put his support behind a bid to raise £30m to buy all of the huge Rothbury Estate.

With just a year to go to raise the full amount or risk the estate being divided up and sold off, Sir David encouraged people to get behind the bid.

The Rothbury Estate is the largest area of land to be put up for sale in England for many years and would be a key part of a 40-mile wild corridor, stretching from the coast to Kielder and the Scottish border.

Mike Pratt, Northumberland Wildlife Trust's chief executive said that the purchase was a 'once in a lifetime opportunity' to bring nature back at scale.

5. Rivers, Sea & Coast

There was great energy in the Swarland Village Hall for the CRAG meeting on October 23rd. About sixty people gathered to celebrate the achievements of CRAG during 2025 and to look forward to the coming year.

Julia and Jamie from CRAG described how CRAG has grown during 2025. CRAG volunteers have started riverfly surveying, invasive plant removal and testing for E. coli alongside the regular chemical water testing at more than fifty test sites.

Perhaps the highlight for 2025 was the submission of an application for Bathing Water status for Little Shore at Amble. Julia described the huge effort by the Amble volunteers, surveying bathers and local businesses, and building links with government agencies and other community organisations.

Steve Lowe then became a salmon and described his journey from the mouth to the upper catchment of the Coquet. He described the physical and environmental barriers that try to stop him successfully breeding.

Suzie Hardy described the fantastic work that her Natural England team are doing. They work with farmers to change farm management to prevent fertilizers and soil running off fields and farmyards into the Coquet.

Colin Hall from the Environment Agency described some of the impacts of floods on the Coquet. His job is to work with communities to build resilience against flood events. Colin introduced us to the Rothbury and Warkworth volunteers who work with his team to provide resilience during flood events.

The talks were interesting, and we learned a lot. But the strength of the meeting was in the chat before and after the talks. CRAG volunteers mixed with representatives from a wide array of government agencies and community groups. The communication, linking communities along the river together and linking the work of CRAG with that of other stakeholders, suggests that the future is bright for CRAG.

6. Film Nights



Thinking of showing a film ?

Hear from NGH member Katie Scott about her experience

In September 2023 I decided to screen **Kiss The Ground** in our village hall, the Jubilee Hall, in Rothbury. It's a film about the soil, and the idea was to hold a discussion after the showing about farming and the environment, from the point of view of food.

A local landowner/farmer, Walter Riddell of Hepple Wilds, was invited to lead the discussion, and it was chaired by Aidan

Harrison, who has farmed on Simonside all of his life. The event was incredibly well attended. Farmers came too, so the discussion was excellent.

In 2024 we screened **Six Inches of Soil**. Again, we had Walter, but this time he was joined by Rachel Henry, another local famer.

In 2025 we screened a wonderful film called **Ocean**. This time we paid for support for the discussion from The Sea We See, a marine consultancy.

We recently had a stand-alone film screening, taking Farming and Food as the theme. This is especially relevant to our community, as the Wildlife Trusts are in the process of purchasing the Rothbury Estate. This year was the best event so far. We screened two shorter films this time. The first was **Leaving it Better**, with Rakesh Prakash, the producer, plus Kate, one of the activists in the film, at the discussion. The second film was **Growing Rich With Nature**. Gus Nelles, a highly respected organic farmer, who knows the farm and the people in the film, led the discussion.

What we've learnt

We're fortunate that the Jubilee Hall has a monthly cinema, so is equipped with the necessary equipment. If that's not available, the links to many of the films below offer advice and resources about putting on a screening – with some including prompts for discussions, technical requirements etc.

Events were advertised through our mailing list, on Facebook, in our local community magazine, and through posters in local shop windows.

Recently we've started to arrange the room in 'cabaret style' - small tables with four chairs at each. This allowed for a better discussion afterwards, and chatting between films.

7. Updates from Groups



Greener Berwick Action Group – Growing a Sustainable Future

Greener Berwick continues to thrive, with volunteers working across the town to make Berwick greener, cleaner, and more connected.

Our *Growing Communities* team has been busy caring for the raised beds in the town centre, now flourishing with herbs, flowers, and food plants. Friday mornings bring together a regular group of volunteers to keep the beds looking their best. Plans are also underway to install a rainwater collection system to help with summer watering.

The *Transport & Active Travel* group has been surveying bus shelters, checking timetable information, and exploring options for electric bike charging points. Their aim is to make sustainable travel in Berwick safer and easier for everyone.

Meanwhile, the *Tweed Estuary Pollution* team continues vital monitoring of algae and nitrate levels in local waterways. Their work, in collaboration with the Environment Agency, is helping shape initiatives to improve river health—such as creating ponds to capture pollution before it reaches the estuary.

Our *Warm Homes* volunteers have been offering free energy-efficiency advice at local Repair Café sessions, helping residents cut costs and carbon while keeping their homes warm.

The *Zero Waste* team is building momentum with the monthly Repair Café and Tool Library. A new feedback system is providing valuable insights for future improvements, and collaboration with groups in Duns and Morpeth is helping to strengthen a regional repair network.



Looking ahead, Greener Berwick hopes to bring all its activities under one roof and secure funding for next year's projects.

Volunteer with Climate Action Wansbeck



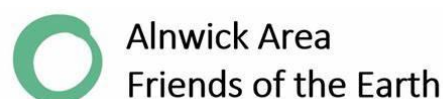

Alnwick Area Friends of the Earth

At their last meeting Alnwick Area Friends of the Earth (AAFoE) discussed progress on their main campaigns, 'The Big Climate Plan' and 'Right to a Healthy Environment' as well as the consultation on Newcastle Airport's expansion plans and the What a Wonderful World festival.



Terry has continued to demonstrate and distribute the environmental Tipping Point game he developed, including taking it to Greener Amble's Fair and the Duchess's Community High School. He is now working with Katie, a visiting student from St Cloud, Minnesota, USA to develop an American version of the game.

Swarland & Newton Action on Climate



SNAC has been working with Forestry England to remove invasive species from around an area of 'wet woodland' in Swarland Woods.

The area was the former Boating Lake of Swarland Hall, which over the years has evolved into this unusual habitat, which can support a wide range of plants, fungi and

invertebrates due to the mixture of wet and dry areas, sunlight and shade and high humidity.

Later this month, volunteers will be creating a dead hedge to help define a path to the area and more work is planned in 2026.



Green Table Event

The Green Table Northumberland is a series of three roundtable events designed to bring together organisations and community groups working to address climate change and improve local sustainability.

The aim is to encourage dialogue between those who are already active and those at the early stage of projects by offering peer support and signposting.




A key part of the focus is to support communities to understand their carbon footprint, enabling them to identify the best ways to reduce emissions and improve energy efficiency.

The first event was held in Rothbury in October and the next Green Table will be in Humshaugh in January and Berwick upon Tweed in May 2026.

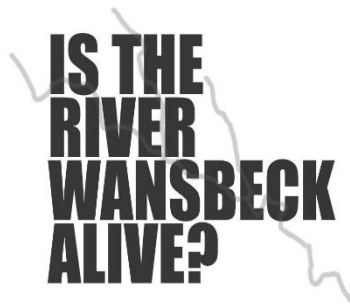
