2. Rivers and Coasts

Update on Port of Tyne Nurdle Disaster

On the 19th of July up to 23 tons of light plastic pellets spilled into the waters of the Port of Tyne. This is deeply concerning for all our coastline. Volunteers have been leading the clean-up operation throughout the area with a well-coordinated and informed campaign getting people on the ground. There are also WhatsApp groups - Druridge, Amble and Cresswell group (covers up to Boulmer) or Newbiggin Community group on the Nurdle Clean up North of the Tyne WhatsApp.

The most important thing we can do at this time is gather regular reports from our beaches - clear or nurdles present. This is best at high tide. If you find nurdles, please send a W3W and a picture, if possible, to Coquetriverriveractiongroup@gmail.com. We have a spread sheet that is constantly updated, we are happy to share this with other organisations assessing the spread. We will put out an alert if clearing needed. When Nurdles are mixed with seaweed we need to disturb as little as possible. Read all the guidance before you start. Here in Northumberland the main beaches affected so far have been Newbiggin and Cambois, with some washing up on Druridge Bay. Birds have been reported eating the nurdles. If you see a dead bird, please report so it can be properly investigated. <https://nurdle-hub-ne.vercel.app/wildlife-impact>

The Wilds of Wannie, the Coquet and beyond - A Community Conversation About the River, its Catchment and its People

In July 2026, residents, volunteers, land managers, conservation organisations, creative and cultural contributors and community groups came together at Wingates Institute to explore what makes the landscapes of Brinkburn & Hesleyhurst Parish special and how they might be cared for in the future.

The event examined the River Coquet, its wider catchment and the connections between landscape, biodiversity, heritage and community. Discussions ranged from geology, farming and river stewardship to woodland creation, peatland restoration, wildlife habitats, local history, storytelling and music.

3. Biodiversity

Rewilding Emblehope

England's largest landscape restoration project under single ownership is officially underway following the acquisition of the 3,035-hectare Emblehope Estate in Northumberland.

Purchased by environmental group RESTORE, the vast upland property is set to become one of the UK's most ambitious hubs for climate resilience, community benefit, and biodiversity recovery. The multi-million-pound purchase makes Emblehope the largest contiguous landholding in England under single ownership dedicated entirely to restoring the natural world.

Once in a generation opportunity for nature

The Wildlife Trusts and Northumberland Wildlife Trust have now raised more than £20 million pounds towards the £30m purchase of the 3,800-hectare Rothbury Estate. Part of the estate has already been secured, but if the full amount can't be raised by September there is a risk that the land will be divided and managed purely for profit.



During August every donation will be doubled, up to £100,000 – this has been possible because of funding from The Dixon Foundation and Ringtons. Northumberland Wildlife Trust has a chance to create one of England's largest areas for nature, for people and for wildlife. Nature on the Greenway

The Borderline Greenway is a not-for-profit community project that aims to convert sections of the disused Alnwick to Cornhill railway line into a safe, traffic-free multi-use path. The first completed section runs from Alnwick to Rugley Bridge, but the long-term vision is for a 100 mile loop connecting Alnwick, Wooler, Cornhill and Berwick upon Tweed.



Recently an ecological audit has been produced by Richard Thomson of Hepple Wild, which confirms the diversity of animal and plant life on the trail, including nearly a hundred plant species, 21 types of fungi, 29 species of birds and numerous invertebrates. The Greenway clearly has potential as a wildlife corridor and the project is keen to explore this further.

Newton Wood – results of public consultation

Forestry England have recently completed a public consultation on proposals for a new area of woodland near Newton on the Moor, called Newton Wood. Thirty-five responses were received. Whilst many were broadly supportive, some highlighted concern and others raised questions and made suggestions.

After considering the responses, further design work has been done and the initial proposals have been updated to include the following changes:

- The woodland design is now better aligned with the Local Nature Recovery Strategy by adding two scrapes.
- The proposed conifer planting has been replaced with a strip of broadleaf planting either side of the watercourse.

The final proposals will shortly be submitted to the Forestry Commission for regulatory review ahead of planting the new woodland. Progress can be followed at <https://consult.forestryengland.uk/forest-districts/newtonwood/>.

Missing Lynx Project Questionnaire

The Missing Lynx Project social consultation is designed to provide a range of opportunities to listen and explore people's thoughts and opinions around bringing lynx back.

The project is a partnership led by The Lifescape Project, with Northumberland Wildlife Trust and The Wildlife Trusts.

The project is inviting stakeholder organisations to share their views through completion of a stakeholder questionnaire (found [here](#)) which is open for a 12-week period in total and closes on **Monday 31st August 2026**.

The questionnaire is not about an organisation's position on whether a lynx reintroduction *should* happen, but rather how a project should be managed and what should be considered to help us in designing the plans if we progress to licence application. Organisations may want to form a position on whether lynx reintroduction *should* occur and we welcome these subsequent to this questionnaire.

5. Consultation

Public asked for views on bus services

The NE Strategic Authority has launched a public consultation on proposals to bring more than 500 routes back under public control, giving Mayor Kim McGuinness responsibility for setting routes, timetables and fares. Private bus operators would still run the services but be under contract to the authority rather than running them on a commercial basis.

Since 2010 the network has shrunk by nearly a third, with some routes disappearing completely and others being reduced, particularly at weekends and evenings. The Mayor has pledged to protect services from cuts and to expand the network.

This is an important opportunity for residents and local groups to have their say. In many rural areas public transport is severely limited – increasing reliance on cars and increasing isolation.

6. Updates from Groups

Climate Action Wansbeck River Group



Over the last year members from Climate Action Wansbeck have been working towards forming a group that would begin testing the river Wansbeck to check on its health. The group decided to use WaterWatch testing kits as we could involve more people in the project. We have over 20 people involved and 18 regularly testing each month over the next year. Our first results have been uploaded onto the Earth Watch website. It's going to be an interesting year!

Climate Action Wansbeck is also sponsoring and supporting the Morpeth Festival of Community Nature and Environment festival and will have a stall at the Community Fair on Saturday 6th September. See the Events section for more details.

CAW will also have a stall at the Wildlife Trust's Nature for Health and Wellbeing Fair at Woodhorn Museum on 12th September. Come along and say hello. Hear about the river testing and see how you could get involved with our next project.

Coquet River Action Group

Crag's Invasive weeds groups have been out in force during June and July with Balsam Bashing proving therapeutic for many groups up and down the Coquet River.

Himalayan Balsam is only available for picking for a short time spell. As soon as it begins to seed work has to stop. One touch and the seeds pods explode projecting hundreds of seeds up to 7m around the plant. Unchecked this plant can occupy up to 95% of the riverbank. If you'd like to be involved next year, get in touch.



Giant hogweed has been reported and removed from a bank in the Warkworth area. As it is highly dangerous, any plants should be reported to CRAG with a What3Words location. It is dangerous to touch and can cause blistering or skin damage that can be reactivated by sunlight for many years after exposure. For guidance and information, visit the CRAG website at XXX.

Well done to our specialist volunteers who have now attended courses and gained certification on removing Japanese Knotweed near rivers. A meeting developing our Invasive weeds strategy will take place in November.

Full Circle Food Project

Let's Grow Newbiggin is a community gardening project transforming underused public spaces into welcoming areas where local people can grow food, learn new skills and connect with their neighbours. Working alongside residents, volunteers and local partners, we are creating edible planting, wildlife-friendly spaces and attractive community growing areas that everyone can enjoy.



The project includes a mix of raised beds, planters, edible hedging and small pocket growing spaces across Newbiggin, making fresh fruit, vegetables and herbs accessible to the local community. Through regular volunteer sessions, participants gain practical gardening knowledge, improve their wellbeing and help care for the spaces, creating a lasting sense of ownership and pride.

Our aim is not only to grow food, but to grow stronger communities by bringing people together to improve their local environment, encourage biodiversity and inspire sustainable, healthy living.

Newbiggin Environment Network (NEN)

Tyne Nurdle Spill & Clean-Up Effort

Following the collision in the Port of Tyne in July, an estimated 24 tonnes of plastic pellets (nurdles) entered the river, impacting North East beaches, including Newbiggin Bay.

Local volunteers from NEN and further afield have been heading to the beach just after high tide, twice daily, to collect nurdles. A green box containing nets, sieves, and gloves is available outside the Maritime Centre door.



Northumberland County Council has placed a large blue bin outside the Maritime Centre for depositing and measuring collected nurdles. You can check the Newbiggin Environment Network Facebook Page for cleanup schedules or visit the Nurdle Hub NE Website and WhatsApp Group for real-time guidance.

Plastic Free Newbiggin Initiative Update

We continue to discuss how Newbiggin Town Council can fully back our aims to be a plastic-free town. This has been signed by the following organisations - The Hive; The Salvation Army; The RNLI; The Maritime Centre; The Hub and Community Sports Centre; The Artisan Café, The Fruit and Veg Shop; The Choir by the Sea; The Elizabethan Hall Art Club; Newbeginning Wood children's bookshop (so far) and we are pending confirmations from The Needles Eye, The Golf Club, The Co-Op, and two others. Our

next steps will be contacting Northumbria Water regarding plastic prevention in rivers/seas and planning a household plastic-reduction event at the Salvation Army in the New Year

- NEN have submitted comments to Northumberland County Council regarding the planning application for a new AI Data Centre at West Sleekburn.
- There is a planning group for a repair café at Elizabethan Hall – NEN have been taking advice from the well-established group in Berwick.
- Solar Powered Newbiggin -this working group is meeting from September - watch out for our solar powered sunflowers all over Newbiggin!
- From September NEN will be affiliated to Friends of the Earth UK
